BONNER COUNTY TOWN OF NORDMAN TO HOST SEPTEMBER "CAPITAL FOR A DAY"

(BOISE) – Governor C.L. "Butch" Otter announced today that the **Bonner County community of Nordman** will host the next Capital for a Day on **Wednesday, September 19th**.

Governor Otter brings State government to Idahoans living outside Boise each month by making a different town in Idaho the state's "Capital for a Day." The meetings provide local residents an all-day opportunity to have open discussions about government issues with Governor Otter, members of his Cabinet and other senior State officials.

The next Capital for a Day is scheduled from **8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Priest Lake Lodge in Nordman**. Governor Otter also will join local officials at noon for a hosted luncheon at the same location.

State officials joining Governor Otter at Capital for a Day will include **Lieutenant Governor Brad Little, Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna, Secretary of State Ben Yursa, Department of Fish and Game Director Virgil Moore, Idaho Department of Lands Director Tom Schultz; Colonel Brad Richey, administrator of the Idaho Bureau of Homeland Security; Dustin Miller, administrator of the Office of Species Conservation; Bill Booth of the Northwest Power and Conservation Council, and Dan Redline, regional administrator for the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality.**

Also on hand will be senior representatives from the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, Idaho Transportation Department, Idaho Department of Labor, Idaho State Police, Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, State Division of Building Safety, and the Idaho Department of Water Resources.

"The lakes, forests and lush landscapes of the Idaho Panhandle seem to be a world away from southern Idaho's high desert. Indeed, northern Idaho attracts visitors and part-time residents from all over the Northwest and beyond," Governor Otter said. "My goal is to ensure the 450-mile distance between Nordman and Boise is no barrier to the voices of Bonner County being heard not just by their locally elected representatives, but by everyone in our State government."
