GOVERNOR TO CONDUCT JANUARY CAPITAL FOR A DAY IN KUNA

(BOISE) – Governor C.L. "Butch" Otter announced today that the **Ada County community of Kuna** will host the next Capital for a Day on **Friday, January 25th**.

Governor Otter brings State government to Idahoans living outside Boise each month by making a different town in Idaho the state's "Capital for a Day." The meetings provide local residents an all-day opportunity to have open discussions about government issues with Governor Otter, members of his Cabinet and other senior State officials.

The next Capital for a Day is scheduled from **9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Kuna City Hall**. Governor Otter also will join local officials and residents at noon for a no-host luncheon at El Gallo Giro Mexican Restaurant, 482 W. Main St., in Kuna.

State officials joining Governor Otter at Capital for a Day will include **Lieutenant Governor Brad Little, Department of Insurance Director Bill Deal, Office of Energy Resources Administrator John Chatburn, Idaho Transportation Department Director Brian Ness, Division of Building Safety Administrator Kelly Pearce, Department of Environmental Quality Director Curt Fransen, Public Utilities Commission President Paul Kjellander, Department of Health and Welfare Director Dick Armstrong, and Idaho Tax Commission Chairman Rich Jackson**. Also on hand will be senior representatives from the Idaho Department of Commerce, Idaho Department of Labor, State Department of Education, and the Idaho Department of Water Resources.

"For many Idahoans, Kuna is little more than a Boise suburb with a connection to caves. The reality is much more interesting, with a rich history growing out of the Treasure Valley's leadership in, and dependence on, irrigated agriculture," Governor Otter said. "Today Kuna has an identity independent of its larger Ada County neighbor. It's both a throwback to the area's rural heritage and a window to a future that builds on what's best about Idaho's small towns."
